Options' mission is to break the cycle of addiction that causes crime, homelessness and broken families. For nearly a decade, Options has provided in-prison training and treatment for inmates with Substance Use Disorder. Our Occupational Mentor Certification Program (OMCP) has trained over 1,000 inmates as peer mentors in violence reduction techniques; these peer mentors now work in all 32 prisons throughout the state, and in many community organizations outside of prison, providing opportunities for recovery and violence reduction. In 2018, Options initiated its Violence Intervention Program in Oakland and Berkeley funded in part by the California Board of State and Community Corrections.

Founded in 2022, Options' Academy of HOPE (Healing Opportunities and personal Enrichment), located in Oakland, provides instruction, support, and community opportunities for formerly incarcerated adults from Options' in-prison program, the Occupational Mentor Certification Program, who are transitioning as returning citizens. These remarkable individuals are applying their lived experiences to help others dealing with substance use disorder, fostering hope and healing within our community and serving as peer mentors. Men attending the Academy of HOPE find a home at the Thomas Gorham Center in Oakland, while women in the program reside at Options housing on 3rd Street in Oakland. The program is spearheaded by George Smith as the Program Manager, Jessica Sias as the Program Supervisor and Thomas Martinez as the Project Supervisor, working with participants to arrange instruction and opportunities to engage in community projects. One of the key community projects, Youth with Options, provides mentorships and leadership activities for local youth.

In 2018, we initiated our Violence Intervention Program, with partial funding from the California Board of State and Community Corrections. Our returning citizens with their lived experience are trained and receive professional life coach/ credible messenger training and certification to adequately serve our community youth."

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Academy of HOPE at Gorham Center

At the **Academy of HOPE**, men and women with lived experiences are trained as certified professional life coaches and credible messengers. These individuals play a crucial role in assisting youth with high-risk lifestyles, guiding them towards positive pathways and away from harm. Through partnerships with various community-based organizations, Options' credible messengers – who are also certified drug-and-alcohol counselors – engage with at-risk youth at Oakland Technical High School and other youth organizations in the community. They provide invaluable support in areas such as job readiness, job placement assistance, workshops addressing criminal thinking, gang intervention/prevention,

self-identity development, financial literacy, and socialization skills. Additionally, they offer process groups, one-on-one peer support, and certified drug and alcohol counseling services, such as brief relapse prevention techniques. They lead workshops on topics such as anger management, conflict resolution, gang prevention and gang intervention, and develop trusting mentor relationships that allow the youth to discuss any stressors related to violence or crime. In addition to working directly with individual youth, Options' mentors spearhead community healing and restorative efforts, such as community clean-up days. These events not only contribute to the physical improvement of our neighborhood but also foster a sense of ownership and pride among community members. By working together to beautify East Oakland, our credible messengers and volunteers demonstrate the power of collective action in creating positive change as well as community healing and restorative effort.



Community CleanUp Days

Community-based partners include but are not limited to:

- 1. G.R.O.W. (Growth Reinforces Our Worth, Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT), gang prevention/ intervention, mentorship in the community as well as in the juvenile halls and juvenile camp facilities; job readiness, case management
- 2. Y.S.A. (Youth Spirit Artworks) (art training program committed to empowering low-income and homeless Transitional Age Youth (TAY) youth, ages 15-25 with job skills, and to transform lives)
- 3. Safe Spaces (empowering youth to change the conversation around mental health)
- 4. My Story Matters (promotes healing, inspires hope, celebrates courage, improves self-esteem, builds confidence and inspires imagination)
- 5. Alameda County Probation Department (referral by Juvenile Justice staff of youth returning to the community for mentorship and additional support, as well as youth in the community)

The impact of the Academy of HOPE's outreach extends beyond individual interventions; it helps to cultivate a safer and more supportive environment for all members of our community. Through program for at-risk youth, pre-incarcerates adults, incarcerated adults, and post-release adults who than use their experience and training to work with at-risk youth and vulnerable adults, Options is working to build a long-term, sustainable solution to address violence before, during, and after its occurrence. Options' 2021 Summary Evaluation concluded that participants in our Violence Intervention Program reported decreased criminal behavior. Similar findings are anticipated for the current program, which will be enriched by support from Alameda County's Violence Prevention and Intervention program.
